- ☑ Over **30% of U.S. Nobel laureates** in chemistry, medicine, and physics have been immigrants.

Immigrants fill essential roles across many industries, from healthcare to agriculture, fueling economic growth and supporting millions of American jobs.

- ☑ Immigrants account for **28% of all small business owners** in the U.S., creating millions of jobs and contributing significantly to the economy.
- ☑ Immigrant labor is crucial in agriculture, where they make up **73% of the U.S. agricultural workforce** Source Source.
