Anti-Immigrant Rhetoric Fueled by Misinformation

Misinformation Feeds Fear

Much of the anti-immigrant rhetoric circulating today is based on unfounded claims that fuel fear and division, particularly around economic impacts, crime, and social services.

- 50% of Americans believe immigrants increase crime, despite studies showing they are less likely to commit crimes than native-born individuals.
- ☑ Contrary to popular belief, most immigrants contribute more taxes than they use in public benefits.

Immigrants Do Not Drain Public Resources

Net Contributors

One common myth is that immigrants drain public resources. However, numerous studies show that immigrants contribute significantly to the economy through taxes, consumer spending, and labor.

✓ Immigrant households contribute \$165 billion in federal taxes and \$105

billion in state and local taxes annually.

☑ Immigrants contribute more in taxes than they use in public benefits, making them net contributors to public finances.

Crime Rates Among Immigrants

Less Likely to Commit Crimes

Despite claims that immigration leads to increased crime, research consistently shows that immigrants, including undocumented ones, are **less likely** to commit crimes than native-born Americans.

- ☑ Studies from the **Cato Institute** show that undocumented immigrants have a crime rate
 - **50% lower** than native-born citizens.
- ☑ The presence of immigrants in communities is correlated with **lower crime rates**.

Economic Impact of Immigrants

Helping, Not Harming the Economy

Contrary to the claim that immigrants take jobs from native-born citizens, immigrants are job creators and essential contributors to economic growth.

- ☑ Immigrants started 28% of all U.S. businesses in 2021, helping to create jobs and drive innovation.
- ✓ Immigrants have a collective spending power of \$1.3 trillion, contributing significantly to consumer demand and economic stability.

Public Safety and National Security

Do Not Pose a Security Threat

Anti-immigrant rhetoric often falsely associates immigration with national security risks. In reality, immigrants are less likely to pose a security threat than native-born citizens.

☐ The likelihood of an American being killed in a terrorist attack by a refugee is 1 in

3.64 billion annually.

Refugees undergo extensive security screening before being admitted to the U.S., making them one of the most **vetted groups of people** entering the country.

Facts Over Fear

Anti-immigrant rhetoric is often based on fear and misinformation. By sharing fact-based responses, we can counter harmful narratives and highlight immigrants' true contributions. Immigrants are job creators, tax contributors, and community builders, essential to the success of America's economy and culture.
